Purpose

To provide the Board of Trustees with a summary of the activities for July 2026 by Cowichan Bay Fire Rescue.

Incidents:

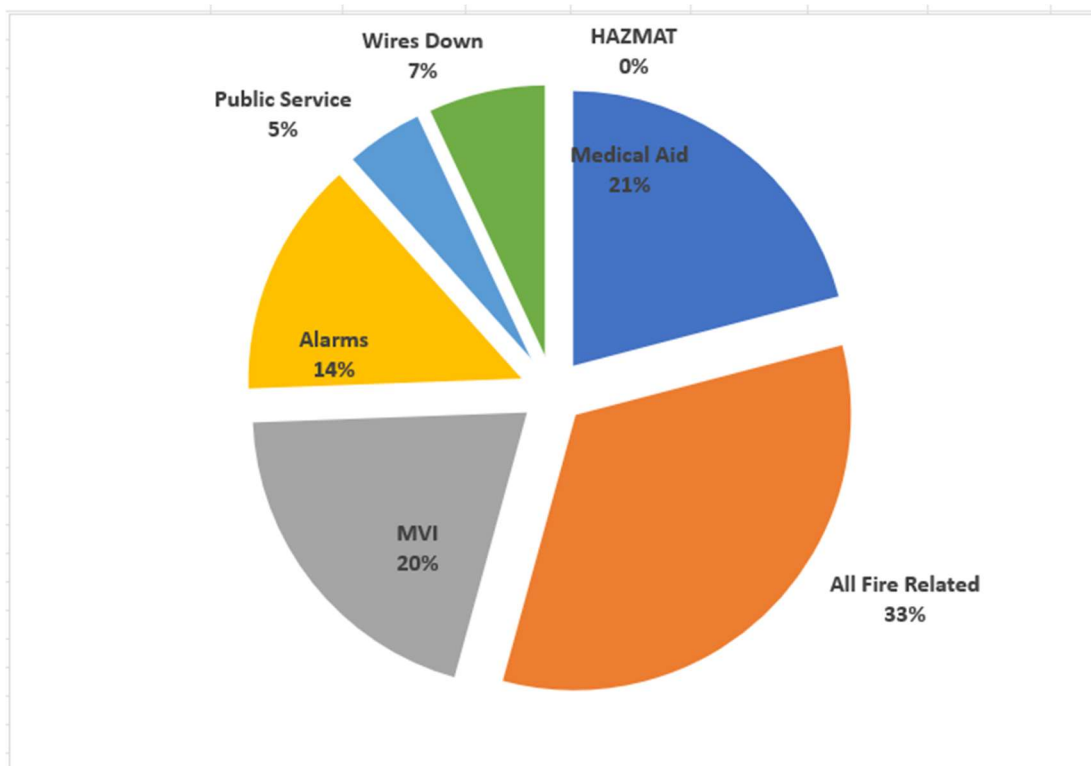
For the month of July Cowichan Bay Fire Rescue attended 25 incidents. This included two mutual aid structure fires with Duncan Fire and one structure fire in Cowichan Bay. The province requested our assistance with the current wildfires in the province on July 24. Tender 42 and crew got deployed to Kamloops and has been working in the Clinton area on the Big Bar Complex since.

As set out in the Cowichan Bay Improvement District Bylaw 109-22 Fire Department Establishment Bylaw, Cowichan Bay Fire Rescue responds to several different types of incidents.

The table below shows a breakdown for type of incidents by month. The totals are at the top of the table. This table also shows the percentage of each type of incident responded to.

Membership:

At the end of July membership was 33.

The breakdown is as follows:

- 2 Full-time Career Certified members
- 17 Active Paid on Call Certified members
- 9 Active Paid on Call members working towards certification
- 5 Recruits

Training:

Training continues on a weekly basis for all members, ensuring operational readiness and ongoing skills development. In addition to regular Monday evening training sessions, supplementary training is conducted during duty weekends, providing members with additional opportunities to enhance their knowledge and practical skills.

Duty crews continue to benefit from smaller, focused weekend training sessions organized by their officers. These sessions have been well received by members and allow for targeted skill development, practical exercises, and mentorship opportunities in a more personalized learning environment.

Fire Prevention and Public Education

The Department continues to actively promote fire and life safety throughout the community. One member regularly attends meetings with the Cowichan Valley Fire Prevention Association, helping maintain strong regional partnerships and consistent prevention messaging.

Fire Department Administration Activities

The administrative side of the Fire Department continues to remain busy, with members of the public regularly attending the fire hall seeking information on fire safety, emergency preparedness, and general safety-related inquiries. Staff continue to provide guidance, support, and education to residents, contributing to the overall safety and resilience of our community.
